

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear UUFSC members and friends,

It is difficult to find words to capture all that is happening in our country. From the devastation of COVID, to the fraught economy, to the maelstrom of the fall elections, to the social injustice and inequality that is rampant in our society, there is a lot to ponder and worry about. It would be disingenuous to recognize our current national situation as anything but what it is—distressing, concerning, and emotionally draining. So, where do we go from here?

I cannot think of a better support group than the members and friends of UUFSC. I look forward to being with you again soon. At its August meeting, the Board reconfirmed its decision to hold services online through

the month of December. In November, a decision will be made about the rest of the UU year. The health and well-being of our members, many of whom are in the most vulnerable category, is paramount. We will not return to in-person services until the perils of the coronavirus have been extinguished. But as the spring and summer showed us, that does not mean that we cannot stay connected. The consistent high attendance at the online services confirmed that we can connect in meaningful and spiritually satisfying ways.

We will reconvene with our first service of the UU year on Sunday, September 13th. All services will be from 10:30-11:15 a.m. The link information is in this Quest (on the front and back pages) and will be emailed to everyone once a month. The link and phone number for the service will be the same for every service, so please put this information where you can find it each Sunday.

A listing of the topics for services for September can be found in this Quest, but I am excited about our plans, so I would like to share a little preview of the topics through December. Our first two services will follow tradition: the first service will be the Ingathering and Water Ceremony, and the second service will be the annual President's service. Following these, we will turn to the themes proudly displayed on the banner that hangs outside of our Fellowship (see picture on page 1): Black Lives Matter, climate change, immigration, women's rights, gender equality, and love is love. Our minister, Mary Tiebout, will introduce a topic on one Sunday with readings and a reflection and then the next Sunday will be followed up with a lay-led service with a further exploration and discussion of the topic.

So, we have lots to look forward to. But most importantly, we have the support and companionship of each other to carry us through these difficult times. And for that, I am exceedingly thankful. "See" you soon!

A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Hello RE Friends,

As I write to you, the large Rose of Sharon bush in my yard is dropping its final white, pink and purple blossoms of the season and I can't help but feel sad that this sign of the end of summer is here again. It goes without saying that this summer has been unlike any we have ever experienced, and yet, it is important to say it; we must mark the truth of this strange experience

of Covid-19.



Globally and nationally, we've been through so much since March, fighting many seemingly invisible enemies whose results are real and dangerous; systemic racism and the intersections of all systemic oppression in particular, are at the forefront of our collective and Unitarian Universalist consciousness. There is still a lot of work to be done, and much to learn, and I'm excited to be a part of our congregation as we learn and grow.

This being said, usually in the first Quest of the year I have many exciting plans to share with you about our upcoming RE time together. This year,

though, as our Fellowship plans to continue our virtual experience, I am sorry to say that the Religious Education Program will be suspended until we can meet again in person – whenever it is determined we can safely return.

After a lot of thought and consideration, the issue weighing most at the heart of this decision is that it seems very unfair to ask children who are already looking ahead to many changes in their normal school experience to commit to yet another online platform. Online RE participation in our program at the end of last year proved challenging for most of you.

I personally still plan to attend our online Fellowship when I am able and to volunteer organizing certain programs that are dear to my heart (including increasing awareness concerning the climate crisis and systemic oppression), but while we are online, my role as Religious Education Director will be put on hold.



Though it makes me sad to miss this year with your beautiful children and all the growing they will do, this increasingly feels like the right path for all of us. If you have any questions, concerns, or ever just want to reach out, I am always available and would love to chat. My hope is that the children are able to peacefully navigate a balanced and reimagined "new normal," rooted in prioritizing the health of their hearts, minds, bodies and spirits. I know that you as their parents and caregivers will lead by your examples.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

Our Social Action Committee is asked to join UU the Vote in Action. I suggest that we meet to discuss how we can together help on September 9th at noon. I will be sending out a Zoom invitation which will allow us to meet for 45 minutes.

In the meantime, listed below are current and timely actions needed to be taken in the moment:

1. **A2212** needs to pass the Assembly because it is an important first step for EJ legislation as it "requires DEP to evaluate environmental and public health stressors of certain facilities on overburdened communities when reviewing certain permit applications."

ACTION: http://bit.ly/stopenvironmentalracism

2. **S57** is a bipartisan bill that has passed the Environment and Energy Committee and needs to be read and passed in the Senate. It urges the governor and attorney general to pursue legal action against fossil fuel companies for damages caused by climate change.

ACTION: Call Senate President Sweeney (856) 251-9801 and request that S57 be read to the Senate now and call District 24 Sen. Steve Oroho: (973) 300-0200 to urge Sweeney to have it read.

3. Moratorium Monday continues. We ask that no fossil fuel projects are permitted in our state.

ACTION: Call Gov. Murphy at (866) 586-4069.

4. **The Poor People's Campaign** is asking us for help since Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell refuses to pass a stimulus package to help the millions facing hunger, evictions and unemployment on top of the pandemic. He also is abdicating his duty to protect democracy by sitting by and doing nothing while the US Postal Service is sabotaged by the current administration.

ACTION: Call Mitch McConnell at (202) 224-2541.

You might imagine a Washington without him and consider donating to his opponent, Amy McGrath, at: amymcgrath.com

Thank you with all my heart. We know social justice is not a sprint to the finish but an eternally slow and laborious marathon that must be won.
