Jan. 5 Happiness: An End or the Means? Our Declaration of Independence says that all "are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Helen Keller would have worded that last phrase differently. Led by Mary Tiebout.

Jan. 12 International Gender Equity Bruce Knotts, the Director of the UU-United Nations Office, will discuss gender equity in the international environment and how the UU-UNO is working to influence the UN agenda on this topic. (Women's Rights: Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights is one of the 5 core program areas of the UU-UNO.) He will illustrate his talk with descriptions of 6 women who have had a big impact on his life, including Mother Teresa. Program host: Barbara Kelly.

Jan. 19 At the Movies in America Eighty years since the release of "Gone With the Wind," we acknowledge that perhaps some of that story is not entirely "gone." Films have been, in a way, cultural currency, with the power to open, close or change our minds and the responsibility, even when telling a story, to tell the truth. Have films changed us? Which ones have taught us? Why do film scores stay with us for decades? Led by Mary Tiebout.

Jan. 26 Love at First Sight Wise men say only fools rush in... But Richard Goffman is going to lead us on a brief exploration of the mythic – or is it? – phenomenon called love at first sight. We'll take a look at examples in literature, in music, in popular lore and in real life. Is there a scientific basis for this phenomenon? And if there were, what fun would that be? What's your take?

A LOOK AHEAD... Feb. 2. To vote Aye or Nay. To speak up or remain silent. Rev. Mary explores the choices we make that are driven not by legal definition, but rather by moral obligations. Feb. 16. Congregation President Jeff Wallis discusses Utopias: A Search for a Perfect Community.

Dear Friends,

On December 19, after signing the bill that will allow New Jersey's undocumented immigrant residents to obtain driver's licenses, Gov. Phil Murphy, holding the signed bill in front of him, declared, "This is the law of the land!" Afterward, Johanna Calle, Director of NJ Alliance for Immigrant Justice, spoke of the decades that people have been working to get this measure passed, the opportunities for employment that will be



opened up to immigrants who become legal, insured drivers, and the dignity and respect for immigrants that has always been tied to this issue. Johanna is well-known to members of the Immigrant Task Force of UU FaithAction NJ, as an organizer, an ally, and as a speaker at task force meetings. For years, the issue of driver's licenses was a legislative priority that Johanna urged our task force to support. We're happy for everyone who will benefit from the passage of this bill.

A note of thanks to Sally and Stevie and to all who helped to make the Holiday Shoppe a success. Thank you to whoever donated the tin horn which I bought and tried to play while stopped at a light in Hackettstown. It sounded more like a kazoo than an English hunting horn, but I'm sure that with practice, my playing will improve.

It is our mission to provide opportunities for spiritual nourishment and to address issues that trouble the community and the larger world. 
Recent activities:

SAVE THE DATE!!! Saturday, January 18 2-4 PM MAJOR CONCERT EVENT




Come to a world music concert by **Chuck Wood and Friends** at our Fellowship— and bring your friends!

On Sunday, December 15, 2019, Dianna Morrison from NORWESCAP presented an interesting program about the wide variety of services which her organization provides to poor and disadvantaged residents of Northwest New Jersey, including Sussex County. NORWESCAP, a non-profit organization which began in 1965, offers many vital services to these families throughout our area.

After coffee hour was over that day and everyone had left the building, I was finishing my work in the kitchen when I heard a knock on the outside door. I looked out to see a woman's face in the door's window. I called for her to come in.

She was a young woman in her 30s wearing a light winter jacket and no hat, despite the cold wind outside. She asked if the large artificial tree in the parking lot (which was left over from our Holiday Sale in a box marked "Free") was available.

"Yes," I said.

"May I take it?" she asked.

Again, I said, "Yes, please do."

She told me that she had three children, was pregnant with her fourth child, and that she wanted to have the Christmas tree for them. "By all means, please help yourself, and Merry Christmas to you," I said.

"Merry Christmas," she replied as she left, "and God bless you."

"God bless you, too," I said.

I watched through the window as she opened the trunk of her car and loaded the large tree to take home. I thought of Dianna Morrison and what we had just learned about the needs of so many poor people in our county. I was glad that our fellowship was able to make a Merry Christmas for at least three local children this year.
